Paulette Berger was born to Maxine and Wilbur Miller July 15, of 1952. Following her parents' divorce, she and her mom lived with her maternal grandparents until her mother married Bill Hall and moved to Zionsville. She attended Zionsville schools and graduated in 1970, 4th out of a class of 86, a class officer and very active in other school activities.



Paulette's mother died suddenly in 1969 and she wondered how she would be able to attend college. Because of the Dollars for Scholars campaign in the community, she was given enough money to cover tuition and with jobs and scholarships from IU was able to finance her first year of college.

At Indiana University she won academic honors. She was the first of two women to be inducted into Alpha Chi Sigma fraternity for chemistry majors. She earned her BS in 1974 graduating Cum Laude with a degree in secondary education majoring in Chemistry.

She married Rob Berger, Class of 1970; in 1974 and began her teaching career at Zionsville Community High School. As a beginning teacher, she was given the least rigorous classes and was extremely glad when she finally got to teach chemistry!

In 1995, she was recruited by IU to teach a dual credit course through a new program called the Advanced College Project. The course curriculum was approved by IU as well as the labs and final exam. As an adjunct faculty member she was able to get software and hardware from Microsoft. She was also involved in the development of interactive problem solving software called CALM – Computer Assisted Learning Method.

Over her forty years in the classroom, Paulette sponsored many extra-curricular activities. She organized the Science Club and was the coordinator of the Super Bowl competitions in multiple subject areas. She was instrumental in getting ZCHS invited to be on the local TV show "The Brain Game." The 2010 team won the Brain Game competition and \$10,000. Her students also competed state-wide and nationally in academic competitions where they were champions in New Orleans and Chicago.


Paulette is on the Boone County Board of Health and was during Covid. She has volunteered for Boone County Habitat for Humanity and Boone County Retired Teachers Association. JOHN MARK CLELAND, Posthumously

EDUCATOR, COACH & MEDICIAL SCIENCE TRAILBLAZER

"John Mark Cleland died peacefully on February 7, 2022. He was born on April 29, 1951 in Rochester, IN to Glenn Edward and Donna Castleman Cleland. After his graduation from Rochester High School in 1969, he attended Purdue University, receiving a BS degree in Animal Science in 1973. Later, he obtained a MS degree in Education. On June 2, 1973, John married Judith (Judy) Fritsch in Anderson, IN.



John loved spending time with his family – his parents and siblings, his wife, his three children, and his seven grandchildren. His parents were central figures in his life until their deaths and inspired many of his interests, including in agriculture and military history. He enjoyed coaching, encouraging, and watching his sons, Chris and Brice, and daughter Cecilia participate in sports. He enjoyed family vacations to the beach and to historic sites. Also, his focus was on watching his grandchildren grow and learn. He also was an avid fan of all Purdue University sports, a passion he passed down to his children.

John worked for Genetic Plus for 5 years partnering with Bob Bridge of Rochester. Afterwards, he taught biology for 31 years at Zionsville High School. He was known for his upbeat personality, friendliness, and corny "dad jokes". At ZHS, he also coached cross country and track for several years. He loved following the athletic, academic, career and personal life successes of his athletes.

Agriculture, especially Animal Sciences, were key factors in his life. While attending Purdue, John was a member of the Dairy Judging Team. In 2014, he was awarded the Department of Animal Sciences Distinguished Alumni Award. After retiring from teaching, he authored a book on the history of the Purdue Creamery. John was a 50-year collector of milk bottles, and during the Indiana State Fair, he relished playing the role of the "milkman" at Pioneer Village.

John was a 47-year cancer survivor, of which he was immensely proud. He was the first person to be successfully treated for testicular cancer with cisplatin, now one of the primary treatments for the disease. After recovering from cancer, he strived to exude a "Carpe Diem" attitude for the rest of his life. In 1980, he received Dick Lugar's Fitness Festival Come Back of the Year Award. In 2002, he was a torchbearer for the Winter Olympics and later was the first recipient of the IU Cancer Center Torchbearer Award. In 2004, he was awarded the Sagamore of the Wabash Award, the highest honor bestowed by the Indiana governor. "1.

of Zionsville Community High School in 2010. Tim retired in 2024. Jenni retired after 24 years of teaching Language Arts and Math at Zionsville Middle School.

Tim graduated from Ball State University in 1986. ROBERT N. GOSSMAN, Posthumously EDUCATOR, COACH, PRINCIPAL, AND INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT

Robert N. Gossman enjoyed not only what he did for the Zionsville school system which at times included Eagle and Union Townships, but also his extracurricular activities. Robert married Wilda "Tommi" on January 23, 1948. They had four children Karen, Sharon, Ralph and Jill. At the Zionsville Methodist Church he was not only a member but an usher and trustee.



Mr. Gossman graduated from Broad Ripple High School in Indianapolis and was a World War II veteran. He received his Bachelor of Science degree from Butler University where he also earned his Master's Degree and Superintendent Licenses.

Some of his activities were: improving curriculum's and service to students at both Eagle and Union Townships, establishing special education classes here, improve services to handicapped students, and upgraded "middle rooms" which served students in the 3rd to 5th grades who needed extra help with school work. He also broadened the program on student achievement and aptitude testing for the purpose of helping place students and working with parents and teachers to help children succeed to the best of their abilities. Mr. Gossman also increased guidance offered to children in the 6th through 8th grade. Libraries were also enhanced in elementary and junior high schools through his tenure. He also worked and began the use of Initial Teaching Alphabet System of teaching students how to read. More importantly near the end of his career, he was instrumental in blending Eagle and Union Township Schools, setting up bus routes, and establishing the school day. He was also interim superintendent from 1970-1971. Mr. Gossman passed in June, 1971.

If this wasn't enough, he was a "work-a-holic". The extra-curricular activities he was also involved in is the following:

- 1967 Zionsville President of Lions Club.
- Member of AF & M Masonic Lodge in Zionsville.
- March 1970 Zionsville Jaycees Distinguished Service Award for outstanding work for the Zionsville School Systems and community.
- Past president and coach of the Zionsville Little League.

LEONARD GRIZZLE, Posthumously ETHS CLASS OF 1954 COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER & MENTOR

Leonard D. Grizzle was born in Indianapolis, December 1, 1934 to parents Charles and Mary Grizzle. He was the youngest of his four siblings Bill, Glen, Stanley and Bonnie. His father worked periodically as a farm laborer and his mother cleaned houses.

Leonard lived most of his life in Zionsville and graduated Eagle Township High School now Zionsville Community

High School in 1954. His grandmother and mother emmigrated from Newfoundland and his grandfather worked for the Hudson Bay Trading Company in Canada.

Leonard had a very strong work ethic from a very young age when he started with a paper route in the village at the age of five in order to earn money for his family. He worked at the South Side Market on Main Street after school stocking shelves and delivering groceries.

Working after school did not allow him the opportunity to be in extracurricular activities at school but he did serve as a patrol boy in the mornings and afternoons.

Leonard married Sharlene Bennington and they had two daughters, Lana and Lisa, both of whom graduated from Zionsville. He had a granddaughter, Sara, and two great grandchildren, James and Charolette. He later married Ruthann in 1976, giving him two step children, Tricia and Rob, and two step granddaughters and two great grandchildren.

He served in the Naval reserves for many years and was active duty in the Mediterranean for two years where he received several accommodations, one of which was for bravery during a storm at sea. He was honorably discharged in 1959 and returned to Zionsville where he was offered a job with the street department from then town marshal Maynard Moore. He continued in his role as street department supervisor for over thirty years and hired college students during summer breaks where he served as an inspirational influence and mentor to many young men.

During his long run serving the town and its residents he became known to many as simply "Grizz". He was called upon to do just about any task that could be imagined and was known to provide a favor or two for town people when requested.

Leonard was a dedicated volunteer member of the Zionsville Fire Department for thirty-one years and retired in 1992 as Assistant Chief of the ZFD. Much of his desire to become a firefighter was the result of losing his own father in a tragic fire at their home when Leonard was young. He was a member of the Indiana Fire Instructors Association, completed training as an EMT, taught classes to new recruits and conducted guided tours of the fire house to grade school students. One of Grizz's favorite roles was the preparation and setting off of the fireworks for the annual July Fourth display at Lions Park.

Leonard was a member of the Zionsville Jaycees and received an award for outstanding service. Two of his favorite hobbies were playing euchre and square dancing. He also enjoyed all patriotic events and celebrations. Leonard's friendly demeanor serving the town and its people allowed him to become one of Zionsville's all-time favorite servants and ambassadors of good will.

WALTER H. HARMON, Posthumously

ETHS CLASS OF 1920 EDUCATOR 48 YEARS, ZHS ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL, LAST BOONE COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

"Walter H. Harmon, notable local historian, began his education at the Royalton School, drove a horse and buggy 6 miles to Zionsville and graduated with the Eagle Township High School, Class of 1920 now Zionsville Community High School. In the summer of 1920



he received his "A" teaching certificate and began teaching that fall at what was known as Swamp College School. The next summer he received a "B" certificate from Central Normal College at Danville. Later a "C" certificate was earned for one year of study and a 2-year Normal Certificate. In 1930 he received an AB degree from Central Normal and in 1940 a Master's Degree in Education from Butler University.

His 48 year career here in Boone County included 2 years at Swamp College, 7 years at Royalton, and 38 years at Eagle Township High School, several years of which he was Vice Principal. He retired in 1967 and served as the last Boone County Superintendent of Schools in the school year 1969-1970 during which he compiled his manuscript" 1. entitled "Early Schools, Eagle Township Boone County". After he was retired from teaching, Mr. Harmon served as Deputy Assessor for Eagle Township.

Mr. Harmon's parents were James and Zarelda Clements Harmon and was born in Boone County on May 10, 1901 and married Myrtle Mays. In the late 1920's he and his brother were contracted to construct the rural electric line coming into Boone County. The line ran from Avon through Brownsburg, Fayette and Royalton. They had three children Nancy Stum, Terry Ralph Harmon and Bennie H. Harmon and had seven grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren, and two step-grandchildren; brothers Ivan, Guy and Dare Harmon. He passed August 17, 1989 and is buried at Salem Cemetery.


He was a member of Zionsville Christian Church, Zionsville Masonic Lodge No. 197, and the Royal Arch Masons No. 148 at Broad Ripple. He served on the first board of directors of the Patrick Henry Sullivan Foundation now named SullivanMunce Cultural Center and was a noted authority on local history.

Our family always appreciated his friendly manner, highly respected him and he always looked sharp even though he had a handicap from polio. We will always remember and appreciate his September, 1969 special eulogy at my father's funeral who was also an educator at Eagle Township High School. His attributes to me were also "patience, kindness, dedication, willingness, quietness, integrity, and as a gentleman". Mr. Harmon was an educator who gave his life, that this school may live in the hearts and minds of many!

I have known Brian since he participated in the Zionsville

Middle School Football program, coached him in the ZCHS football program and have the privilege to follow his career as a coach, and learned from him as he presented at football coaching clinics. Brian's keen interest in high school football developed this interest into a career. He is an outstanding example of hard work, determination and perseverance.

Brian experienced two injuries that required surgery in high school. This type of injury usually requires a year to recover. He was determined to beat the expected timeline and devoted himself to rehabilitation. While many people would have written off trying to participate, Brian poured himself into his recovery. In a demonstration of his hard work, determination and perseverance, Brian was able to play and contribute to the team by the middle of his senior season.

While playing football in college, the same injury occurred forcing him to immediately begin coaching the team he had been a part of and pursuing a profession that would become a career.

In the following years, Brian demonstrated the same drive and zeal for hard work. He continued to learn and improve his knowledge and coaching abilities. He was an asset to the football programs he coached and gained the trust and respect of some of the best younger college coaches in the nation. He was hired to be part of their coaching staffs, as they ascended to head coaching positions. His expertise as a Special Teams coach earned him professional recognition by being nominated for the Frank Broyles Award recognizing the best college assistant coach in the country. After coaching for one year at the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana, he was contacted by the Indianapolis Colts of the N.F.L. and was hired as their Special Teams Coordinator this past season.

Brian has B.A. degree in Ecomics from Denison University, M.A. in Education from Bluffton University, a Masters from Purdue University in Recreation and Sports Management and a Masters from Ohio State University in Kinesiology and Sports Management. His coaching career spans from Student Assistant at Denison University to Special Teams Coordinator to present.

TIM OTTINGER

ZCHS CLASS OF 1972 ZAA PRESIDENT, COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER

Tim Ottinger was born September 14, 1954 to Burl and Mary Jean Ottinger, the younger brother of sister, Tina (Ottinger) Hand. His ancestors span eight generations in Boone County. He grew up on a small farm four miles west of Zionsville which now is the Royal Run community. After 30 years between Cincinnati and Los Angeles, Tim currently resides today in his childhood home.



Tim graduated Zionsville Community High School in 1972 as a 12 year senior following a very active school career involving being a percussionist in concert, marching, dance and pep bands, member of the concert choir and Royalaires, Aerie yearbook staff, art club and the photography club.

Following high school Tim attended Purdue University receiving a B.A. in Industrial Design and shortly after an M.B.A. in Marketing from Xavier University in Cincinnati. He subsequently obtained a G.R.I. with the Realty Institute and was accredited with the National Association of Realtors.

Tim began his professional career with Kenner Products in Cincinnati in 1977 when the company received the product licensing for STAR WARS. His first responsibilities was a product designer deeply involved in the rapid development for that franchise. But shortly after he took a postion with a design consulting office, Design Alliance which enabled him to work in a variety of industries including Batesville Casket Company coining the phrase ""I've designed toys to caskets".

In 1983 he moved to Los Angeles and joined Alpine Electronics of America, widely known for car audio to develop their entry into the emerging cellular and mobile security markets. His experiences included trips to Japan, far from his roots as a farm boy in Indiana. In the 90s he took his design and marketing talents into the POP (Point-of-Purchase) display and packaging industries until the early 2000s, transitioning into residential real estate with one the largest privately owned firms in the country, Shorewood Realtors. He sold \$20M in 2008 but with the recession and more open spaces calling, in 2009 he and his family moved back to the hometown of Zionsville.

In recent years, Tim served as Adjunct Professor at the Art Institute of Indianapolis instructing college level courses of "Entrepreneurship" and "Principles of Marketing". But more importantly his volunteer interests kicked into high gear. SCOTT ROBISON, PH.D.

ZIONSVILLE COMMUNITY SCHOOLS SUPERINTENDENT 2006-2023

Dr. Scott Robison devoted nearly four decades of his life to public education. His retirement as Superintendent was effective February 1, 2023 after 17 years at ZCS (Zionsville Community Schools).

Born in New Albany, Indiana in 1958, Scott Robison was the third of four boys raised in a blue collar neighborhood adjacent to the housing projects. Neither of his parents



graduated from high school, but taught work ethic and personal responsibility. All boys graduated from high school and attended college, with three achieving multiple advanced degrees.

Starting as a teacher in New Albany, Robison and 150 others were released and rehired in a two-year span due to financial crisis. This uncertain employment sent him to work as a university alumni director in the IU system at Indianapolis. He re-entered the K-12 public education, teaching and becoming a principal in MSD Pike Township and then Southwest Allen County Schools in Fort Wayne. He served as chief financial officer, curriculum director and superintendent in Westfield Washington Schools. Robison then served as superintendent of the Sheridan Community Schools Robison prior to joining ZCS in 2006.

Named Educator of the Year in 2022 by the Indiana School Boards Association, Robison was recognized for his academic excellence, financial stewardship and attention to personal relationships. Dr. Robison also received the Governor's prestigious "Sagamore of the Wabash" recognition presented during his retirement reception. The "Sagamore of the Wabash" is the Governor's highest honor bestowed upon Hoosier citizens. The award is a personal tribute to those who have rendered distinguished service to the State of Indiana through their wisdom, public commitment and concern for the wellbeing of others.

As a leader, Scott worked hard to serve our youth during times of dynamic challenges. he and the ZCS team had to navigate property tax reform, passing operating referenda, the Great Recession, COVID, redistricting, expanding mental health support and school safety standards, adopting new calendars, and explosive enrollment growth which saw the addition of ZWest Elementary School, Boone Meadow Elementary, Trailside Elementary and multiple expansions of ZCHS (Zionsville Community High School).

Three highlights stand out in Dr. Robison's accomplishments. They are: GROWTH

During Robison's tenure from 2006 to 2023, Zionsville's population more than doubled from 12,800 to more than 31,000. ZCS had under 3,000 students in 2006 and more than 8,400 in 2023.

COVID-19

In 2020-21, no one could see what was coming with the onset of Covid. Somehow Robison and the ZCS team steered through those enormous challenges with exemplary leadership.

HUMANITY

Under Robison's leadership at ZCS he instilled one of the most important lessons of life with three simple words- "Everyone Belongs Here" supporting dignity, humanity, and inclusion for all.

In retirement, Scott plans to spend time with his wife, a Westfield Washington Schools teacher, help in her classroom, volunteer, write, and travel the U.S. in his new Airstream. The Robisons have three children.
